Contextually relevant technology to support families with neurodevelopmental disabilities

Digital technologies are rapidly emerging as tools to support the identification of and intervention for autism and other developmental disabilities. This process was accelerated during the COVID-19 pandemic, when remote technologies sometimes were the only tools to reach and support infants, children, adolescents and their families. In principle, technologies therefore have enormous potential to empower families around the globe. However, there are many challenges to implementing digital technologies. One key challenge is the fact that children and adolescents who may need support live in culturally, linguistically and socio-economically highly diverse communities, and access to technologies may be hugely variable. Therefore, there is a great need to consider the accessibility, affordability, and cultural appropriateness of potential technologies across diverse communities. Another key challenge is the fact that cultural and and the state of the control social care systems look very different around the globe. In this symposium, we will present four examples to illustrate how remote technologies were developed in culturally- and contextually-sensitive ways in participation with a range of stakenolder (roups.
